





FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR

SEPTEMBER 2018

The next fruit of the Holy Spirit that I am going to discuss is generosity. The stewardship ministry team at Christ the King has decided to use this word generosity going forward as the name of our ministry. This is to emphasize the work of the Holy Spirit and this specific fruit of the Spirit as Paul reminds us in Galatians 5:25 when he says that "If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit."

The word generosity is found in a few places in scripture:

Romans 12:8 – "The exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness."

- 2 Corinthians 8:2 "For during a severe ordeal of affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part."
- 2 Corinthians 9:11 "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity, which will produce thanksgiving to God through us."
- 2 Corinthians 9:13 "Through the testing of this ministry you glorify God by your obedience to the confession of the gospel of Christ and by the generosity of your sharing with them and with all others."

The word generous is found more frequently in scripture as here are a few examples:

Exodus 35:5 – "Take from among you an offering to the LORD; let whoever is of a generous heart bring the LORD's offering: gold, silver, and bronze;"

Psalm 51:12 – "Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a generous spirit."

Psalm 112:5 – "It is well with those who deal generously and lend, who conduct their affairs with justice."

Proverbs 11:25 – "A generous person will be enriched, and one who gives water will get water."

Proverbs 19:6 – "Many seek the favor of the generous, and everyone is a friend to a giver of gifts."

Proverbs 22:9 – "Those who are generous are blessed, for they share their bread with the poor."

Matthew 20:15 – "Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?"

Acts 2:46 – "Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts."

Acts 10:2 – "He was a devout man who feared God with all his household; he gave alms generously to the people and prayed constantly to God."

Romans 10:12 – "For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him."

FINANCIAL STATUS

We received Progressive Matching funds of \$4,800 in June. Next year this amount will be only about two thirds of this amount. We had a five-Sunday month in July. The treasurer transferred funds from Helping Hands to Operating. These actions resulted in elimination of the deficit as of June, and Christ the King is in the black for the moment at the end of July.

However, the estimated projections going forward using the current rate of operating income indicate that by year end the deficit will be approximately \$7,000.

Why? Because the operating income giving is less than what is needed to cover operating expenses. We cannot continue to operate this way. Your financial support is needed if we are to continue operating with the budget as approved last November.

Budget time is approaching and <u>all</u> Ministries will need to provide realistic projections to be included in the planning for 2019. Your promises to support the Ministries in place at Christ the King are necessary and a vital part of this budget process.

We are the branches By Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, Presiding Bishop of the ELCA

Is it possible to be Lutheran and an ecumenist? Of course, the answer is yes. The ELCA has continued the work of our predecessor churches—the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, the American Lutheran Church, and the Lutheran Church in America—all of which engaged in dialogues with other denominations. When the ELCA was born, its DNA included the will toward unity. The 1991 Churchwide Assembly adopted "A Declaration of Ecumenical Commitment: A Policy Statement of the ELCA"—we were barely 4 years old.

Where did this impulse come from and why is it so deeply important to us?

We have just marked the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. We were a little restrained about celebrating because division in the church is nothing about which to rejoice. (Though when explaining this sensibility to a Roman Catholic colleague and dialogue partner, he did say the reformers' insistence on the primacy of the gospel is something to be celebrated.) It was never Martin Luther's intention to divide the church. Loathing the thought that this new movement should be called "Lutheran," he wrote: "How should I, a poor stinking bag of worms, become so that the children of Christ are named by my unholy name?"

The intent of Luther and the reformers was to give the gospel free course in the world, to make the evangelical case that it is God's good and gracious will to reconcile the world to God's self, and that this has been accomplished through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ apart from any human effort.

Early on, in 1530, the Augsburg Confession not only clarified and defended the evangelical position of the Reformation but made it clear that the reformers' work was consistent with the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church. (You should all study the confession. I know of congregations that have read and studied this and all the Lutheran Confessions found in the *Book of Concord*. Ask your pastor.)

This wasn't a departure from the Christian tradition, nor a break with the church. The Seventh Article of the Augsburg Confession laid out the basis and the possibility for church unity and a variety of expressions of how the gospel could be communicated: "For the true unity of the church it is enough to agree concerning the teaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments."

But this is really Christ's intention and the reality that we have in him. Jesus said, "I am the vine, you are the branches" (John 15:5). We all are not only connected to the same vine, but we have no life apart from that vine. In Holy Communion, we live Christ's current and our future reality that we are already one. The ELCA humbly tries to embody this truth in the six full-communion partnerships we already have with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the Reformed Church in America, the United Church of Christ, the Episcopal Church, the Moravian Church, and the United Methodist Church.

We are scripturally, confessionally and even constitutionally wired to be an ecumenical church. This month's cover story highlights the ecumenical ministries of congregations and the work of ELCA Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations. It is possible to be Lutheran and an ecumenist.

But let me pose this—it is not possible for Lutherans to be ecumenists if we are not Lutheran. This might sound counterintuitive, but I believe it is true. If we aren't clear and conversant about the Lutheran movement's way of telling the Jesus story, if we are not clear about the grace that sets us free, if we waffle on the conviction that the reconciliation and redemption of the world is God's work and not ours, how can we enter into dialogue and relationship with other branches of the Christian tradition?

I called on us to read the Small Catechism during 2017. If you have put your copy away, dust it off and start studying.

Cyberbullying and the church

My take

There is a website that, at first glance, appears to be working for good. But delve a little deeper into it, and you'll quickly find evidence to the contrary. On display is human sin: hatefulness and harassment directed at individuals or groups online, known as cyberbullying.

Which site am I referencing? Well, it could be any, including and especially any form of social media, but I'll leave that to your imagination.

Cyberbullying is common: the Pew Research Center reports that 4 out of 10 people have been victims of online harassment, and almost 70 percent have witnessed some form of online aggravation. Most alarmingly, evidence indicates young women are more likely than any other demographic to be targets of cyberbullying, often in the form of sexual harassment or other prejudicial expressions.

When the computer or smartphone creates an imaginary barrier between people, it's much easier to lose one's inhibition and give way to anger and spite. We've all seen it—the seemingly harmless Facebook post that causes a spiral of aggressive commentary. (Hint: "Winning" an argument on social media at the expense of another's well-being or reputation isn't worth it.)

I wish I could say the church is immune to this behavior, but scrolling through the comments of many lay and clergy groups, sites and threads reveals that we can hate as well as any "none" (unchurched).

There is a better way for us to coexist online, and our faith can guide us there.

It's affecting our youth

The rise of personal technology in tandem with ubiquitous social media is causing an adolescent world of isolation, depression and dramatically increased risk of suicide, wrote psychologist Jean Twenge in "Have Smartphones Destroyed a Generation?" (*The Atlantic,* September 2017). Twenge shows the correlation between levels of screen time and the likelihood of depression and anxiety. The culprit? Cyberbullying. This isn't the backyard bullying that many of us suffered as kids—it's more invasive and dangerous.

My daughter is a high school freshman. Like the majority of her generation, she's consumed with social media. Sometimes when she's moody, we talk about how the online world is affecting her capacity for joy. I think she gets it. Nevertheless, she shows much of the same anxiety Twenge identifies.

Adolescence is its own crucible, and the added anxiety of social media's demands only makes it worse. If our kids' self-worth is based solely on their Snapchat streaks, the church is failing them. They are baptized children and priceless treasures to the God who created them. As ELCA members we should be doing our utmost to make sure that youth are feeling loved and celebrated. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, suicide among teens and young adults has nearly tripled since the 1940s. I pray our congregations address this issue before they are forced to bury a precious person whose life was cut short.

The toxic reality of social media in our time is a metaphor for the larger soul-sickness that is pervasive in our culture. Christians should know better, but we aren't immune to it. Cyberbullying has no respect for one's faith narratives. In fact, online harassment is considered to be a crucial factor in the decline of American religious adherents, according to a 2016 article in *Psychology Today* by sociology professor Phil Zuckerman. Not only is this atmosphere of hate harming our children and ourselves, but it is attempting to dismantle the koinonia of saints and sinners who gather under the banner of God's love.

A way forward

Jesus upends the social media nightmare with these words: "Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbor, 'Friend, let me take out the speck in your eye,' when you yourself do not see the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor's eye" (Luke 6:42).

To paraphrase this in postmodern language: We need to become self-aware to the level where we can love people through their challenges without judgment or sharing criticism. Our task as Christians is to humble the self and exalt the other, which stands in direct contradiction to the cutting sarcasm in the digital realm.

Many ELCA congregations have effective social media policies that protect the innocent from being exploited, but we can be more proactive by adopting a system of best practices for our personal online behavior.

Moreover, we should encourage our youth groups and adults as well—to take a pledge to confront online bullies and stand up for the victims of any form of harassment.

The apostle Paul was no stranger to controversy. At times he even found himself at odds with other church members. But he does end most of his letters with words that would be fitting to start any congregation's policy on life together in real time and cyberspace: "Finally, brothers and sisters, farewell. Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you" (2 Corinthians 13:11).

We must engage with our congregations, synods, youth groups—joining with any expression of Christian community is the perfect means by which the light of Christ can banish the darkness of online hatred.
